Service Learning 101 for Kindergarten-Higher Education

If you are new or fairly new to service learning, this session will provide you with a strong foundation in this methodology. Participants will gain practical service-learning strategies; understand basic concepts, rationale, and goals of service learning; explore effective programs; learn principles of effective initiation and implementation; see examples of arts-focused service learning; make linkages with curricula; and learn to assess community needs and project impacts. The training will offer valuable resources designed for higher education and K-12 faculty.

Service Learning and Artistic Sensibilities: Uncovering, Connecting, and Creating Meaningful Habits of Mind

An essential goal of service learning is the development of civic responsibility for making the act of service with our community an habitual part of how we and our students live our lives. A reflection and comparison of postmodern art, aesthetics, criticism, and service-learning theory point to an alternative form of this goal for visual artists-a goal that enriches our artistic sensibilities, dispositions, or habits of creating through an enduring need for creating meaningful art/acts of service. Told through stories of art education service learning, this presentation will suggest rationales and guidelines for challenging artists to habitually dare to respond to the cries of the world (Gablik, 1991) through meaningful artistic acts of service and learning.

Character Education through Theatre Arts

Come to this presentation to learn about a model character education project at Seven Springs Middle School in New Port Richey, Florida. The presenters will explain how they started the project six years ago as a way to use drama to influence behavior and inspire compassion and understanding. The collaboration with chorus, reading classes, professional actors, and guidance is explained. Impacts have included fewer incidents of harassment and bullying at our middle school as well as an increased awareness of service as a valuable pursuit. Lessons learned include the importance of clear communication, extensive preparation, and guided student involvement. Participants will create a short freeze-frame story about a bullying incident and share this skit with others.

Art in the Market: Empowering Communities through Art

As a language of possibility, art is a democratic medium, connecting participants from different walks of life. As co-creators, service-learning participants experience art to exchange perspectives, while learning from one another. Art-based service learning can uncover and reconstitute the untold perspectives and voices of various groups in order to restore and affirm the legacy and unrealized potential of the forms of subjectivity, agency, and experience of such groups. Combining concepts and strategies from many areas, such as participatory action-research, service learning, critical race theory, asset-based community-development, and liberatory education, the Art in the Market Program illustrates how service learning can empower communities.

Hero's Journey: Extraordinary Journey of Artful Teaching

The Hero's Journey is one of the oldest stories told. Every culture has its version, every version has its nuance, but the journey is the same. Heroes take ordinary moments and make them extraordinary. How do we as educators impart knowledge to our students so that we may influence them in an extraordinary way? Learn what makes the artful process so powerful that current business leaders tout it as essential to move successfully into the future. Learn what core competencies the arts build and how service is fundamental to the artist's process. Learn how to use the arts within the peak learning state of play and discover the power of "The Courage to Teach," "Appreciative Inquiry," and "The Arts Model."

Reach Art and Touch Someone: Community Outreach Work in Progress

This workshop will provide participants with insights to create an effective after-school arts outreach program that provides service-learning opportunities. Project partners include the Vero Beach Museum of Art, Indian River Community College, and a charter high school for the visual and performing arts. Program recipients are low-income students from K-12 schools and after-school care providers. Session activities include development of a definition for effective community outreach arts education and meaningful assessments, from initial exposure to mastery levels. The roles of high school and college service learners in the implementation of this model will also be discussed.

Components of the Community Act as Sources of Pedagogy

What variables should be considered when educators are collaborating with the community or doing the "community act?" Using examples from community-based art education and service-learning, this presentation will address some possible components of doing this work. By considering these components we can inform and enhance educational practice that responds to community empowerment, cultural practice and self-determination as important aspects of successful collaborative partnerships.

The Service Shakespearience

This interactive workshop will help teachers form connections between Shakespeare's works and service-learning/character education. A model for a cross-age Shakespearean performance involving high school students and elementary or middle school students will be presented. In addition, there will be a discussion of some of the themes of Shakespeare's works that still resonate today (e.g., racism in *Othello*, anti-Semitism in *The Merchant of Venice*, and suicide in *Romeo and Juliet*) and ways to link those themes with action (service-learning/character education). Many handouts will be provided for teacher replication.

Extending Poetry and Multidisciplinary Projects Beyond the Classroom

How can teachers help students develop poetry and multidisciplinary projects that start off in the classroom and move into the community? Panelists will discuss their experiences working with young people in the Chicago area to develop meaningful arts projects that connect young people with their artistic selves, the communities in which they live, and other people who share common goals in terms of those projects and their visions of community.

This model, which has been collaboratively developed and implemented over the past seven years, is an approach to sustainable, mutually beneficial service-learning partnerships. Service Learning through Empty Bowls

Participants will learn the process for Lake County, Florida's "Empty Bowls" service-learning fundraising project that benefits poverty-level families. Hear how South Lake High School, a National Service-Learning Leader School, multiplied their participation level from one class at one school to eight schools with multiple class contribution. Step-by-step instruction will include the history of the "Empty Bowls" project in Lake County, a work plan with the elements of service learning, integration of the Florida Sunshine State Standards, and integration of Just Read, Florida! Participants will learn the bowl-making process as they make and paint their own bowls and leave with an informational handout.

Through the use of educational games, guest lectures, large and small group discussions, theatre games, and improvisational scene work, topics such as drug and substance abuse, teen pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases, and violence are explored. At the HeART of Learning and Community

Painting the Town: Visual Art in the Community

This session will present models of community engagement through visual art. We will explore programs developed through campus-community collaborations at Massachusetts College of Art, the School of the Museum of Fine Arts, and Tufts University College of Citizenship and Public Service. Youth and Community Development: Programs, Policies, and Perspectives

This session will explore issues, programs, and policies in community arts that engage youth during out-of-school hours with community organizations for social and community development. In the first half of the session, we will contextualize contemporary programs in historical perspective, and present federal programs and policies that have supported youth arts efforts relative to community development. In the second half, we will ground the historical and theoretical through a presentation of the Community Art Corps, a unique partnership between community organizations, youth, and the Maryland Institute College of Art. Issues relative to the practice of community arts will be explored. This session is relevant for any practitioners or scholars working with youth and the arts in community development.




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


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
